CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Pragjyotish College is affiliated to the Gauhati University and registered under 2(f) and 12 (B) of the University Grants Commission Act, 1956. The Curriculum Planning and Implementation is performed by each teaching department of Gauhati University for undergraduate courses with the advice of Academic Registrar of Gauhati University. Moreover, each teaching department of the Gauhati University follows guidelines as issued by the Academic Registrar from time to time in planning process of Curriculum Development. Each teaching department of Gauhati University under the banner of ‘Course Committee’ has organized ‘meets and discussions’ with the active participation of some selected faculty members from ‘post graduate departments’ and ‘undergraduate teaching department’ from affiliated colleges as well. The final outcome which is achieved through this process is finally submitted to the Academic Registrar for the final approval for implementation. The Academic Registrar discussed this issue in Academic Council Meeting and if the members of the Academic Council feel satisfied on the final outcome of the curriculum frame, they resolved for implementation and advised the Academic Registrar to do the needful.

The curriculum which is approved by the Academic Council of the Affiliating University i.e. Gauhati University is documented and uploaded in the Gauhati University website for effective circulation amongst the students. Moreover, a download link for curriculum is also facilitated in our college website.

Our college administration has developed an efficient mechanism to deliver the respective curriculum to the students. Adhering to the guidelines laid down by the State Government in general and the Gauhati University in particular, the College Administration developed an ‘Academic Calendar’ to serve for each year’s academic session. The Institution follows a specific Time Table Programme from 9.00 am to 4.30 pm for the effective delivery and transaction of the curriculum. The recent addition of the Language Lab plays an important role in providing new vision to Students of MIL.

The college tries its level best to provide minimum 180 days of teaching in each academic session of the calendar year. Remedial classes (if needs be) are taken during off hours to compensate for the weaker students. The normal class duration for each class is 45 minutes which is started every weekday from 9.00 am till the 4.30 pm. In addition to normal class work, often some teachers engaged their students in seminar presentation and field-study work. The college staff also put in extra labour and effort for running one Distance Education Programmes (KKHOSU). The college authority facilitates the deserved teachers to attend UGC based Refresher Course/ Orientation Courses / Workshops / Seminars or Short-Term Course to update their knowledge and information base.

Reforms as continuous internal evaluation has been initiated by the parent university i.e. Gauhati University .After proper evaluation of answer scripts of sessional examination, concerned teachers of the department show evaluated answer scripts to the students for their better performance. If any students fail to secure minimum passing marks or remain absent on the date of examination, the departments take outmost case to hold re-examination for them .Some of the departments have a good practice of conducting class tests, seminars, group discussions, as well as home assignments for the students which can be considered as a part of the CIE. Again all the departments have provisions for tutorial class which has been allotted in the college routine. The purpose is to clarify the doubts and re-explain the critical topics and also discuss the question papers of the previously held examination. The departmental seminar and discussion is conducted for upgrading the oral skills of the students.

The college authority uniformly decentralises various administrative as well as academic tasks amongst teaching and non-teaching staff on various occasions along with student representatives, wherever necessary. Besides, there are instances where the college authority encourages the involvement of guardians as members of the Governing Body of the college. As such two seats are reserved for the guardians in the GB of the college. Along with it, there are members from the teaching staff, parent affiliating university and the local MLA. 2. In each session, a general election is conducted for different portfolios of the Pragjyotish College Students' Union (PCSU), which comprises of the portfolios of President, Vice President, General Secretary, Secretaries of Minor and Major Games/ Sports and Boys' and Girls' Common Rooms, Debating, etc. The union body plays a very vital role in organising annual college week festivals, Saraswati Puja celebrations, publication of the college magazine (<i>Pragjyotishiya</i>), celebration of other national/ international events under the guidance of their respective teacher-in-charges, apart from participation in various sports and cultural events that are held outside the institution.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment
6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):
Curriculum Development: The College is affiliated to the Gauhati University and hence syllabus and curriculum are designed by the university. It is true that all faculties from the college cannot take direct part

in the syllabus design. Nevertheless, teachers from different departments are members of the Committee on Courses and Studies (CCS) and takes active participation in the curriculum/syllabus development programme.

Teaching and Learning: The college has a general routine and every year it is reviewed by the routine committee for necessary modifications as per the available classrooms, in consultation with the heads of the academic departments. The college also makes provisions and arrangements in undertaking projects, excursions, field works and visits to higher educational/research institutions. Many departments hold talks inviting academicians and experts from other higher institutions, picking up topics which are related to their subject to give the students different exposure other than normal classroom teaching. Departmental seminars are presented by the students assigned to them. Field studies are conducted for students as per the requirement of curriculum with appropriate research methodology followed by preparation of field reports.

Examination and Evaluation: Semester-end examinations are conducted in the college as per the University rules/directions and schedules, and the process of evaluation is done by designated zone of the university. Teachers are assigned duties like invigilators, paper setters and examiners. Teachers from some departments are also appointed as external examiners in other colleges. Sessional examinations are conducted and evaluation done within the college. The end semester examinations and evaluations is under the control of the affiliating university. Sessional examinations for each semester and its subsequent evaluation are done under the directives of the affiliating university. Unit tests/Class tests are also conducted in some departments and the marks along with evaluating sheets are discussed with the students to explore their strengths and weaknesses for further improvement.

Research and Development: The college encourages research work in different streams and has been providing modest infrastructure in some of the departments to carry out research works. Several faculty members have obtained Ph.D guide-ship in the parent university and are actively involved in research works. Many of the faculty members are engaged in minor and major research projects funded by various funding agencies viz. UGC, DST, DBT. The college has also a Bio-Tech hub attached to the Zoology Department. Several faculty members have availed FDP for pursuing Ph.D. Teachers in some departments guide the 6th semester students in the preparation of their dissertation for part fulfilment of their 6th semester final examination. Moreover, teachers are encouraged to develop their research skill by participating in state/national/international level seminars in local and abroad also. The college authority has taken a decision to publish a research journal.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure/Instrumentation: The college library has been partially upgraded by using SOUL.20. OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogues. Internet and photocopy facilities are provided in the library. Most of the departments are equipped with departmental libraries with books relevant to their syllabus and subjects. INFLIBNET and N-LIST services are available for teaching staff. Physical infrastructure development works include setting up of a modern conference hall and works for more classroom and departmental accommodation.

Human Resource Management: Discussions and meetings are conducted on a regular mode by the principal with the teaching and non-teaching staff for the smooth running of classes and other academic as well as administrative works. A vice principal has been appointed to supervise the functioning of academic activities in the absence of the principal. The Principal of the college who is also the Secretary of the Governing body by virtue of his office is directly involved in the day-to-day affairs of Human Resource Management of the college.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration: The Master of Tourism Management (MTM) and Travel & Tourism Management (TTM) courses of the college are directly involved in industry interaction/ collaboration/ linkages. Students of these programmes are regularly sent students for on-job trainings. The department has direct collaboration with the Directorate of Tourism, Govt. of Assam, for internship of the students. Students are also sent to reputed travel agencies, resorts and hotels for private internships.

Admission of Students: The admission of students is done strictly on merit basis. The admission schedule is notified through banners (in the college campus) and through newspaper advertisements. Offline mode is available to apply for any course. The terms and conditions of the admission are clearly stated in the prospectus. Reservations for various reserved are strictly maintained as per Assam Government rules. The Admission Committee formulates all the rules and regulations of admission and prepares a central merit list. On the scheduled dates, admission takes place as per the prepared merit list, after proper verification of the documents. Admission of students in the college is considered strictly on merit basis. The college also follows the rules and regulations for admission of students as set by the State Government and the affiliating university as well.

6.2.2 : Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations:

Planning and Development: The college is thrusting on e-tendering through the college website pertaining to different kinds of infrastructural development contract works.

Administration: Important communication to higher authorities viz. DHE etc are made through emails and vice-versa. The process of sending monthly salary bills of the permanent staff to the Treasury is also being slowly switched over to online mode.

Finance and Accounts: The finance and accounts system of the college has already been computerised. A licenced version of Tally, accounting software is being operative since 2012.

Student Admission and Support: Online application to various courses and programmes has been started.

Examination: All internal examination works are conducted as per the parent university norms. The internal assessment marks are assigned according to the scores obtained in various aspects viz. attendance, home assignments, seminars, class tests, etc. These marks are stored in computer database in some of the departments.

Best Practice 1:		
<u>Title of the Practice:</u> Introduction of uniform record keeping modules		
<u>Objectives of the Practice:</u> The goal of this practice is to encourage the faculty members for planning, maintaining, implementing as well as keeping records of the academic and non-academic activities of each and every department as well as at the individual levels. This practice aims to improve the quality of teaching-learning process for the improvement of academic atmosphere.		
<u>The Context:</u> One of the vital aspects of a healthy educational institution is the maintenance of proper academic records. For this purpose, it was felt that one of the best possible ways in this regard is by maintaining a lesson plan diary in each and every department. Owing to the current provision of API scores that are required for promotional purpose, this practice was felt to be beneficial in maintaining proper records related to API scores.		
<u>The Practice:</u> All departmental faculty members provided with an individual diary by the college authority for noting down their day to day class activities and leave records, which are supposed to be verified by the H.O.D.’s who signs after due authentication. Moreover, the Activity Register was supplied for keeping records of all departmental activities in chronological order.		
<u>Evidence of Success:</u> This practice makes it easier to keep a track of the individual faculty members’ performance in each academic session. As such, with the introduction of this practice, coverage of course content is regular ensured.		
<u>Problems Encountered and Resources Required:</u> At times, the process of daily recording is a challenging one due to excessive workloads arising out of the on-going semester system, which demands continuous evaluation and monitoring of students performance. This sometimes results in delaying the daily record keeping process. To continue this practice, funds are required, for meeting the printing costs of the printed formats. Moreover, monitoring of proper adherence to the practice could not be made through IQAC, due to time constraints.

Best Practice 2:

Title of the Practice: Setting up of an Institutional Publication Hub

Objectives of the Practice: The goal is to add fuel to the literary endeavours of the institution, by undertaking initiatives of a wide variety of publications and disseminate those amongst the society at large.

The Context: The Pragjyotish College Publication Hub was set up in March 2016, and a decent accommodation provided for housing the office of the hub. A steering committee was constituted by the Principal i/c for smooth functioning, planning, execution and monitoring of its activities. The hub was set up with an aim to centrally publish all in-house publications through it

The Practice: The hub after a few of its meetings, decided to undertake the publication works for the century-old Assamese magazine “Chetana” in a book form, which was originally edited and published by Ambikagiri Rai Choudhury and Chandranath Sarma. As a first step, it was decided to collect the old volumes, trace out the missing volumes/pages, compiling and reprinting the same.

Evidence of success: Evidence of success can be assessed only in the forthcoming years.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: No problem was encountered at the initial stage. However, the issue of fund requirement for book publication emerged as a major issue at this stage of infancy.

Best Practice 3:

Title of the Practice: STUDENTS FIRST

Goal: To initiate and inculcate the academic and intellectual discussions amongst the teachers in their own fields of expertise and percolating the same down to students’ level. The core concept of the theme was that teachers are also students in the sense that learning is a life-long phenomenon and we can learn a lot from our peers. Another objective of the practice was to encourage students to deliver presentations of their choice and interest so as to enable them to overcome the inhibitions of public speaking.

The Context: Different faculty members on an institution belong to different fields of academic pursuits and by virtue of their long association and practice in their own fields, gather a vast magnitude of knowledge. It is thought that this wide panorama of knowledge and expertise needs to be percolated not amongst the faculty members alone but also to the younger student generation for enriching and motivating them.

The Practice: On 02.06.2015, three young faculty members (Dr. Bidyut Bikash Baishya, Dr. Makibur Rahman and Dr. Saitanya Kumar Bharadwaj) decided to make a head-on start through an interactive session on the topic “Natural Disasters in North-East India”, that was delivered by Dr. Jyoti Prasad Deka. Both students and teachers are expected to be a part these interactive sessions and interact with the appointed speaker on his/her fields of expertise.

Evidence of Success: After the first session, many more sessions were conducted, viz. “Drug Abuse and the Youth” on 06.06.2015 (by Dr. Makibur Rahman), “Uncertainty in Life” on 08.08.2015 (by Dr. Saitanya Kumar Bharadwaj), “Formulation and submission of R&D Project for Extra-Mural Funding” on 04.09.2018 (by Prof. P.J. Handique, GU), “My Lifetime Experience in Europe” on 04.12.2015 (by Dr. Ranjita Deka), “Geo-parks and Geo-tourism’ on 20.02.2016 (by Dr. Manjit Kumar Mazumdar), etc.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: No financial resources required and the deliberations were arranged with the help of the facilities that exist in the meeting/conference rooms.

Best Practice 4:

Title of the Practice: Youth-led Development Outreach Programme (YDP) in Higher Educational Institutions

Goal: Objectives of the activity is to give a common platform to the participants to think, act and work together in the process of nation building

The Context: Developing awareness regarding disaster preparedness and mitigation is an important segment of education in the present day context. North-east India is a disaster prone state, where floods occur every summer. It is necessary to create awareness amongst the future citizen's on socio-political responsibilities of youth. As Assam is a state which is full of social unrest and separatist movements, creation of awareness and understanding their view points over such sensitive issues is the need of the hour. Again, witch hunting is a serious issue that is prevalent mostly in the rural tribal areas of Assam. An open discussion on its causes and consequences and the role that youth can play to curb this social menace. Proper career guidance is partially absent in this part of the nation. This program of Youth Conclave is aimed to give a common platform to the participating students to build a prosperous life and making of a prosperous India.

The Practice: The Youth Conclave was earlier held in the year 2015 (06.02.2015 – 07.02.2015). The programme held for the second time (15.03.2016 - 16.03.2016), started with a fruitful interactive session on the topic "Natural Disasters in Assam". The interactive session was followed by a practical session on "How to survive during various natural disasters" performed by 1st Battalion NDRF. During the practical session the participants were taught about various measures to tackle during the natural disasters. The participants were also taught to make various improvised devices with locally made products which are easily available and can use them during the occurrence of the natural disasters. A demonstration from Assam State Fire & Emergency Services was also a part of the programme, followed by imparting of fire-fighting skills to the students and hands-on work. The conclave included some burning topics of Assam like socio-political responsibilities of youth with special reference to developing separatism movement in Assam and Witch Hunting.

Evidence of Success: This programme gave the students a strong platform to generate innovative ideas in their minds to contribute to the society.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Although the students have also opined that such programme should be residential in nature, it is not possible for the compact daily class schedule in the semester system of undergraduate education.

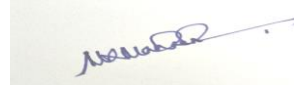
- 1) To impart skill-development training to our young generations, the subject 'Performing Arts' is proposed to be introduced
